- Yet our survey shows Batswana do not share that view.










#### **Support for Democracy by Locality**







# Batswana Overwhelming Reject Un-Democratic








- Which of the following statements is closest to your view?

  - Bogosi is part of our value system and culture and helstrengthen our democracy, it should be retained







#### **Support for Bogosi by Locality**





### **Democracy-Bogosi Paradox**




- Abolish Bogosi Agree + Agree strongly



# **Retain Bogosi by Education**

- Conventional wisdom suggest that as more people are urbanised and educated they will transcend traditional loyalties but the survey findings do not support that.
- Paradoxically overwhelming majorities support both democracy and chieftainship.
- Perhaps blending of traditional and democratic institutions accounts for Botswana's relative political stability
- Bogosi is a necessary partner in democratisation.
