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# What is the Afrobarometer?



- The Afrobarometer (AB) is a comparative series of public opinion surveys that measure public attitudes toward democracy, governance, the economy, leadership, identity, and other related issues.
- The AB is an independent, non-partisan, African-based network of researchers.
- The first round of surveys took place in 1999-2001 in 12 countries. The Network is now conducting "Round 5" surveys in up to 35 countries during 2011-2012.
- **Purpose**: To measure popular perspectives on the social, political, and economic environments in each country where it is implemented and across Africa.
- **Goal**: To give the public a *voice* in policy making processes by providing high-quality public opinion data to policy-makers, policy advocates and civil society organizations, academics, media, donors and investors, and ordinary Africans.



# Country Coverage: 1999-2012




- ➢ Round 1, 1999-2001, 12 countries
  - Southern Africa: Botswana, Lesotho, Malawi, Namibia, South Africa, Zambia, Zimbabwe
  - West Africa: Ghana, Mali, Nigeria
  - East Africa: Tanzania, Uganda
- ➤ Round 2, 2002-2003, 16 countries
  - Cape Verde, Kenya, Mozambique, Senegal
- ▶ Round 3, 2005-2006, 18 countries
  - Benin, Madagascar
- ▶ Round 4, 2008-2009, 20 countries
  - Burkina Faso, Liberia
- ▶ Round 5, 2011-2912, 26 countries
  - Burundi, Cameroon, Mauritius, Niger, Togo, and Sierra Leone

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# Who is the Afrobarometer?



An African-led Network of survey researchers and analysts:

- In each country there is a **National Partner** responsible for survey implementation. In Zimbabwe, the National Partner is The Mass Public Opinion Institute (MPOI).
- Four **Core Partners** provide technical assistance and Network management:
  - Center for Democratic Development (CDD), Ghana
  - Institute for Democracy in South Africa (Idasa), South Africa
  - o Institute for Development Studies (IDS), University of Nairobi, Kenya
  - Institute for Empirical Research in Political Economy (IREEP), Benin
- Two **Support Units** for capacity building and quality assurance
  - Michigan State University
  - University of Cape Town



## **Survey Methodology**



- Nationally representative sample of adult citizens
  - all respondents are randomly selected
  - every adult citizen has an equal and known chance of being selected
- Face-to-face interviews in the language of the respondent's choice
- Standard survey instrument across all countries for comparability
- The survey interviewed (successfully) 2 400 adult Zimbabweans ; a sample of this size yields results with a margin of error of +/- 2% at a 95% confidence level.
- Field work for Round 5 in Zimbabwe was conducted between 16 and 30 July 2012 (6th in a series of surveys held since first round 1999).
- Afrobarometer's work in Zimbabwe is coordinated by MPOI and the field work carried out by MPOI



# **ABR5 Survey in Zimbabwe**



- Sampling frame (2011 projected population figures)
- Sample universe: Citizens aged 18 years or older, excluding institutions for example; police camps, and military barracks
- Cluster size: 8 interviews per Enumeration Area (EA)
- Respondent selection: gender quota filled by alternating interviews between males and females
- Survey languages (Shona, Ndebele and English)


# **AFR BAROMETER** Key findings on Indigenization

- The common view held by the majority of respondents (78%) is that creating jobs is a far more effective way of empowering all Zimbabweans than taking over ownership of business (19%)
- This view was shared by all Zimbabweans in all the ten provinces and across the political divide.

# Topic 2: Local Government Performance





# Key findings on Local Government Performance

- A majority of Zimbabweans disapprove of local government performance in terms of the maintenance of roads (76%) and local markets (51%).
- However, positive ratings were noted in how local governments are performing in terms of handling health standards in restaurants (55%), use of land (48%), and Keeping communities clean (47%).

# **Topic 3: Performance of National Government Leaders**






# Key findings on the Performance of National Government Leaders

- More people approve of the way that the Prime Minister (66%) performed his job over the past twelve months as compared to the President (58%).
- Party affiliation seems to influence approval of the way national government leaders performed their job.

## Conclusions



Regardless of the place of residence and political affiliation, Zimbabweans share the common view that creating jobs is a more effective way of empowering all Zimbabweans as compared to taking over ownership of business.

Rating of the local government performance varied according to types of service delivery. For example, disapproval was higher for local government performance in the maintenance of roads as compared to local markets. Zimbabweans acknowledged the improvements in the performance of local governments in terms of the maintenance of health standards in restaurants, keeping communities clean, and handling use of land.

Approval of how both the President and the Prime Minister performed their job over the past twelve months is moderately higher.
